Organisation of the School

We are lucky enough to now have 4 classes within the school, allowing our youngest children the luxury of following the specialised Foundation curriculum in small groups, giving them the very best start to their education.

Our Classes consist of:

Silver Birch Class – Reception

Crocus Class – Years 1&2

Pheasant Class – Years 3&4

Red Kite Class – Years 5&6



The school day begins at 8.55am each day. All children have a 15 minute break at 10.20, with lunch at 12.05pm. Afternoon school begins again at 1.05pm and the younger children have a 10 minute break in the afternoon. The school day ends at 3.15pm.

We have a daily act of collective worship, usually led by the Head teacher or Senior teacher. Our Friday assemblies are particularly popular with the children as it is a time when the whole school comes together to celebrate and reward effort, achievement and good citizenship. It is also a time to share additional service to the school.

Teaching

The school follows the 2014 National Curriculum, which staff have used to plan a broad and exciting creative curriculum. This allows teachers to cover a range of subjects, such as Geography, History and ICT, to extend the children's learning. Opportunities are also built in for children to apply their skills in Maths and Literacy within the topics being studied.

We employ specialist teachers for Modern Foreign Languages, Gymnastics and PE, which helps to raise standards and develop a passion for these subject areas.

In all subject areas, children are encouraged to develop their independence. To this end, we have a well-stocked library, which is regularly renewed, and an IT Suite, where all children have access to a computer. Independence is also gained in Foundation and KS1, where the children are able to learn, both in the classroom and in our outdoor learning area.

Enrichment activities:

Our children also enjoy a range of enrichment activities throughout their time at school. Sometimes these are "one off" events, at other times they can be developed over 2 or even 3 terms.

One off events have included African drumming and dance workshops, French breakfasts, theatre visits and trips to a local pheasant farm.

Forest school:

Our Foundation and Year 1 children spend one afternoon a week in the woods, attending Forest School. This is a wonderful opportunity for the children, where they can lead the learning, follow their interests and engage in their own curriculum, while all the time, gaining in self-confidence. There are also plenty of chances for them to take this new learning back into the classroom.



Music and Drama:

We have also been lucky enough to have had whole class tuition through the Wider Opportunities in Music scheme, which has, in recent years, provided expert tuition in Brass, Strings, penny whistle and percussion.

The school choir is open to children of all ages and regularly sings at services in St. Michael's Church, as well as concerts with other schools throughout the year at St. Nicolas' Church, Newbury and the Anvil in Basingstoke as part of the Berkshire Junior Music Festival.

School productions are highly valued as they are not only enjoyable, but develop the art of performance, team work, discipline and confidence. We present a Nativity performed by the Infants each Christmas and a Junior production each summer, either through a school-based performance or through our participation in the Confederation of Small Schools, professionally written and directed joint production at the Watermill Theatre



Pottery:

The school has its own kiln and art is an integral part of each child's experience of the school. Our pottery has even been sent to the Queen.

Year 6 Residential Trip:

Children in Year 6 are offered the opportunity to take part in a 5 day residential trip to PGL Osmington Bay. Previous destinations have included Tregoyd in Wales and Beam House in Devon. This is a chance for children to develop their confidence and independence before heading off for secondary school, in a supportive environment, whilst undertaking adventurous and exciting activities, such as abseiling, climbing, raft building, surfing and zip wire.
